NEW ZEALAND BANKS' END PROCESSING CHEQUES THIS MONTH (MAY)

New Zealand members:

Trading banks have announced that they will cease to accept and process cheques at the end of this month (May). We will not be able to accept cheques we receive after their cut-off date of 31 May.

Members who have been accustomed to pays us by cheque will no longer be able to do so.

Options available to members pay money to the Society, whether for subscriptions, purchases, donations, or for any other reason after 1 June are,

- 1. To use internet or on-line transfer from your own account to the Society's account, No. 02-0500-0019277-00 We prefer this option, as it is flexible and convenient for the majority of members.
- 2. To use your credit card or the PayPal system. Note: under these systems the Society has to pay a fee for each transaction made thus.
- 3. To arrange a transfer to the Society's account from either your bank account or by cash payment over the counter at your nearest branch of your bank.

Members living outside New Zealand:

- 1. Options 1 &2 above are available, ie, electronic transfer of funds or use of your credit card. For you to pay direct into our NZ bank account, you will have to add the SWIFT BIC code for the Bank of New Zealand, BKNZNZ22. This has to be used whenever funds are sent from overseas to BNZ bank accounts for the transaction to find the right bank and account.
- 2. Your own bank will be able to make a telegraphic transfer of funds for your payments. There is likely to be a charge for this service.
- 3. Members who pay into our English bank account will still be able to do so using local procedures. Note: Overseas cheques will not be able to be processed in New Zealand.

For electronic payments,

in all cases you will need to state your name, membership number, and the purpose of the payment, ie,

- subscription payment;
- purchase of stated goods, eg, a specific book;
- donations for your specified Society activity; or
- for any other purpose.

NOTABLE DEATH A Tribute to John Yonge

Thanks to Alan Smith for noting the passing of John Roger Basil Yonge in Devon, UK on 18 January 2021, aged 89. John prepared the *New Zealand Railway & Tramway Atlas* published by hiss Quail Map Co. This is an essential book as the atlas contains a lot of information about our railways, street tramways and bush tramways.

John was an Englishman who lived in New Zealand for some time and returned to the UK in March 1965 to live in Devon. His hand drawn maps required a considerable amount of research and in his New Zealand atlas he acknowledges the considerable help gained from issues of NZ Railway Observer. Back in the UK he teamed up with Gerald Jacobs and published railway atlases covering the whole of Britain, Ireland, China and Tasmania.

We are indebted to Mr Yonge for his eye to detail and his mapping skills. We know little of Mr Yonge. Any reader who can tell us more please let us know so we can give a fuller tribute to Mr Yonge.

WMR CARRIAGES RESTORATION

Work since our last report work has been concentrated on the windows for WMR 48, with Mike Dutton and I continuing preparing to be able to put them in place. Mike is preparing guide strips and I have been finish painting and varnishing the sashes for one side of the carriage. This work is continuing.

Lionel Ford is working on obtaining castings we will need for doors and windows. In recent days he has machined a trial pair of castings for reproduction door hinges. Some problems have been found that need to be fixed before we order the full quantity needed for 48.

Lionel has been completing setting up the small machines in a purpose-made table, including a router Tom Halliburton donated some time ago, that we will use as a spindle moulder. This has been needed so we can make the mouldings needed to complete restoring recovered entry doors and to make a set of new interior doors for WMR 48.

Gilbert Coom has donated a very welcome bench vise for attachment to one of our work benches. This is in response to an earlier appeal in *Turntable*. Thank you, Gilbert.

PRESERVING AND DESCRIBING YOUR PHOTOS FOR THE FUTURE



Do you have any photographs taken with a film camera? What will happen to your photos when you are no longer around? Your family or relevant others need to know you want to do with your collection. it is easy to copy your collection while you are in sound health and able to provide copies or originals to the Society. Families can disagree very strongly about the fate of collections, or individuals can destroy them without thought.

How can they be preserved for the future? Please talk to our Archives team for advice.

You need to start with a short description of each photo, using an identity code as an index. Make a diary, a text file set out as a table, or a spreadsheet, with column 1) being the photo identity code, 2) locomotive number and type, 3) a description of the image as a whole, 4) location, 5) date, and 6) any other information of note. Your description should be as full as posible. If there are people in the image, please give their.

For example, what would you write to describe this image? Giving additional information on detail shown is always valuable in the future:

"The Great Western Railway Gloucester - Swindon line. Collet 2-8-0 steam Gloucester - Swindon line. Collet 2-8-0 steam locomotive 3812, is heading towards Swindon with a mixed goods train.

The branch to Tetbury is seen at left in the distance. A plume of steam is from an arriving branch passenger train. The branch to Cirencester is on the right, with a new PWD track recording car on trial at right. The Signal Box is just visible alongside the water tower. The stationmaster's house is seen beyond the station on the right."

If minimal information is available, please do your best to have Photo ID; Locomotive ID; Description:; Location; Date your photo was taken.
